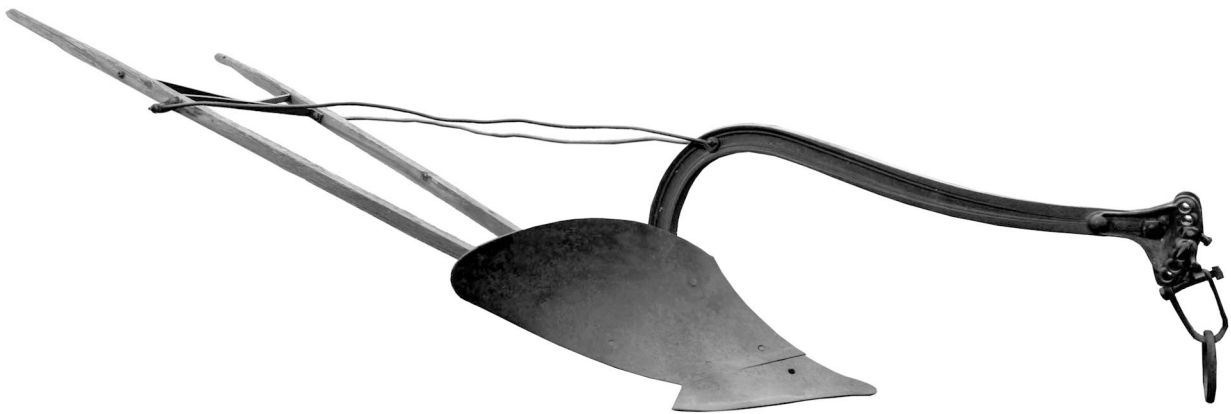


**Germans from Russia Homesteaders
in St. Joseph's Colony
Saskatchewan
Canada**

Introduction

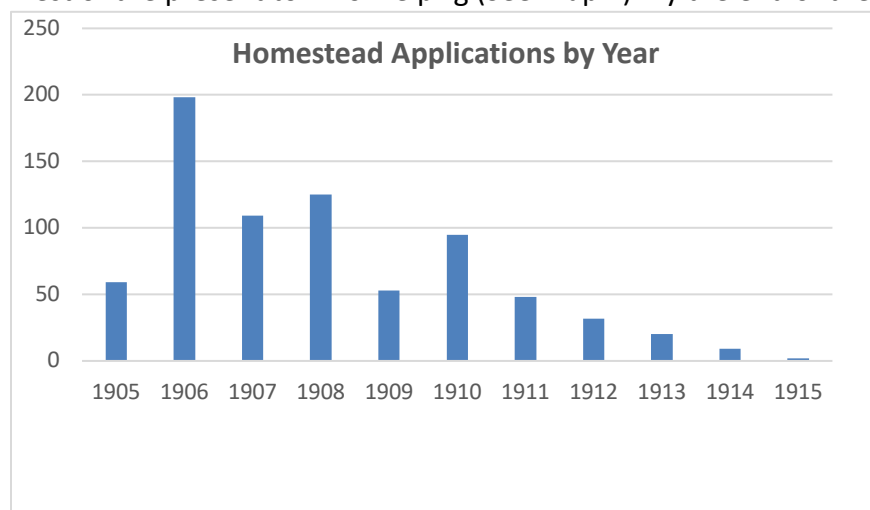
St. Joseph's Colony was founded in 1905, the same year that Saskatchewan became a province. It was the third large Catholic settlement in Saskatchewan; the first was centred around Balgonie east of Regina and the second around Humboldt east of Saskatoon. The third was St. Joseph's which is the subject of this report. The location of these colonies along with other German settlements is shown on Map 1. (see next tab for maps)

The search for a third major settlement area was led by F.J. Lange, an American educator turned land developer. Lange found a vast expanse of flat prairie land between Tramping Lake and the Alberta border that did not have the excessive bush and shrub that had complicated sod breaking around Humboldt. The religious order of the Oblates of Mary Immaculate worked with Lange to attract and assist homesteaders. Father Laufer was the spiritual leader, and he chose an excellent and highly qualified assistant by the name of Father Schweers. Lange and the two priests are considered the founders of St. Joseph's Colony.

Lange's initial plan was to populate the entire colony with German homesteaders, but that turned out to be impossible. Unlike the Humboldt experience, there was no land company to buy up land for a closed colony, nor was the federal government willing to assist. The federal government balked at the idea of another closed colony, preferring that the colony be open to immigration from all countries.

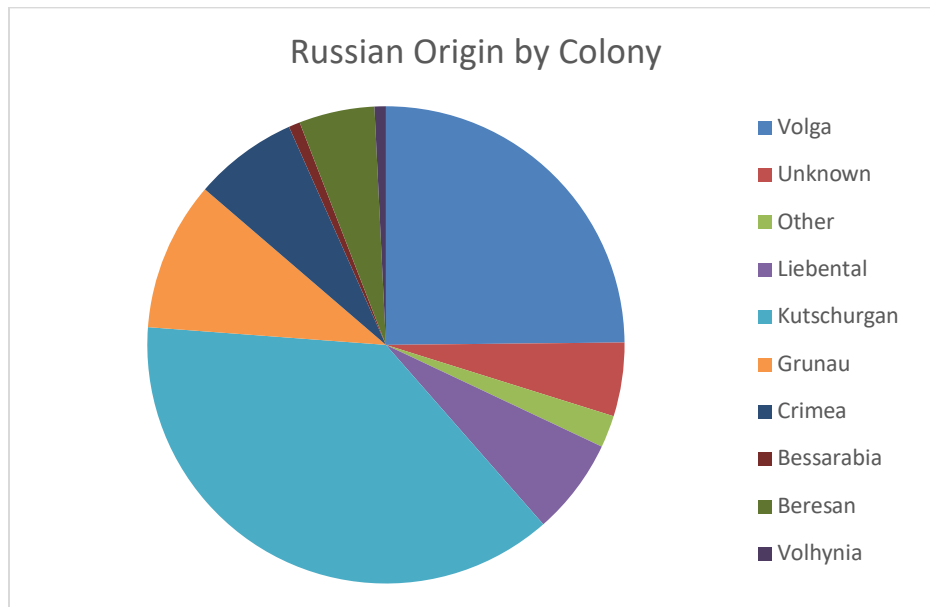
Lange induced the Canadian Pacific Railway to provide some money and for the balance he used much of his own money for advertising the availability of homesteads. The advertising efforts were well rewarded and within a few years, some 780 homestead applications were filed by ethnic German families from Russia (GFR) on the vast prairie region in west central Saskatchewan. (After helping hundreds of newcomers start homesteads, Lange applied for his own homestead north of Denzil in 1911. He later moved to the Goodsoil area further north.)

The first German Catholic settlers arrived in May 1905 at a location 3 miles north and 2 miles west of the present town of Leipzig (See Map 2). By the end of the summer, 30 families had



filed for homesteads in the area surrounding what would become Pascal. More families flooded into the Colony and in less than a decade most of the homesteads were taken up all the way to the Alberta border.

Many of the first arrivals in 1905-08 came from the northern United States, having first settled there, whereas later arrivals in 1908-10 tended to come directly from Russia. I have been able to identify the originating villages in Russia for 95 percent of the homesteaders. This information is included in the tables, illustrated in Maps 5 and 6 and summarized in the following figure.



The GFR homesteaders tended to settle in clusters (see Map 3). Large clusters were established around Tramping Lake, Reward/Denzil, and along the Alberta border south of Macklin. Within these clusters the German language and culture were preserved for at least two generations. The Germans in the smaller clusters shown on Map 3 were more quickly assimilated into the majority English-speaking society.

Other ethnic Germans came from Austria-Hungary, Germany, the United States and elsewhere in Canada. I have not analyzed the homestead data for these Germans, but having worked my way through the census data, I have an impression that they were probably as large in number as the GFR.

The sources of information for this report included the Land Records at the Provincial Archives of Saskatchewan, the 1906, 1911, 1916, 1921, 1926 and 1931 Canada Census, recorded family histories, church and cemetery data, obituaries and a variety of online databases. Most of these are secondary sources and may contain errors. If you have information to help fill in the gaps or make corrections, please send them to me at vollmanken@gmail.com. Much has been written about the hardships faced by these pioneers as they transformed a landscape of prairie grass and rocks into fertile farmland. It is interesting to note that at the

time of the 1926 Census, more than forty percent¹ of the homesteads were no longer occupied by the homesteading family. There were many reasons for people leaving; poor land, terrible weather, lack of experience with dryland farming practices, poor health and even death, and in many cases the land was sold and people moved into the growing towns. Of those who left the Colony, a few families moved back to the Dakotas, but most moved westward to Alberta, British Columbia and Oregon to continue the dream of a prosperous future.

The sixty percent of homestead descendant families who remained on the land would be further tested by the depression and drought during the period 1929 to 1937. Census data is not yet available for those years, so we must rely on anecdotal evidence. A review of a large number of family histories indicates that the failure rate was not very high. Families simply had no options other than to scrape by as best they could with at least a roof over their heads. Banks were lenient on foreclosures. Young men and women took whatever jobs they could find in towns and cities to help out. Overall, it is not unreasonable to conclude that only about one half of the families that left Russia were around to enjoy the prosperous years that came after 1937.

Note: in examining the homestead families, please consider alternative spellings of the family surname. To make my database function optimally I have taken the liberty of often standardizing on the most common surname spelling, for example, Falk, Folik, Folk and Volk are all shown in the family tree Volk.

¹ Of the 780 families who took up homesteads in the years 1905 and following, only 453 were still on the homestead in the 1926 Census.

The Homestead Process

For the arriving homesteader, the process typically began with a visit to a part of the Colony where potential land was available. Once a suitable piece of land was selected, the location would be noted from a survey marker that surveyors had installed at the corner of each section. Some homesteaders bypassed this step by allowing others to make the selection for them. The homesteader would then go to the Dominion Lands office and apply for a right of entry. An administrative fee of 10 dollars was the only expense. The necessary provisions would then be loaded on a cart and the homesteader would set off to “prove up” the land in accordance with the conditions set out below.

The Dominion Lands Act and Regulations, which set out the framework for homesteading, had been in effect for over 30 years when the first GFR settlers arrived in late 1905. During those three decades there were several amendments and changes to the process. The purpose of the Act remained constant however, to encourage settlement of the prairies to prevent the region being claimed by the United States. Below is a synopsis of the process as it existed in 1905.

To achieve the purposes of the Act, the Government wanted to ensure that there was someone living on the land and that improvements were being made. Accordingly, after a right of entry was granted, certain conditions had to be fulfilled.

- The settler must commence cultivation of the homestead within six months of date of entry or, if entry were obtained on or after the first day of September in any year, before the first day of June following.
- Within the first year after receiving right to enter, the settler must break and prepare for crop no less than 5 acres.
- Within the second year, the settler must crop the initial 5 acres, and break and prepare for crop no less than 10 additional acres.
- The settler must build a habitable house before the end of second year and at the beginning of the third year must commence residence on homestead.
- The settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands of his/her intention to make application for title.

There were also eligibility criteria to apply for a homestead.

- An age requirement of 18 years, but if the applicant were younger and already head of a family, he/she could make entry.
- Women were eligible to apply for a right of entry only if they were the sole head of family.

A significant change was made to the Act in 1908. Settlers who had received title to a homestead could apply for a pre-emption by agreeing to pay the market price at that time. A pre-emption was the quarter section adjacent to the homestead if it were available.

- Resident requirements for the pre-emption could be satisfied by residence on the homestead.
- Cultivation requirements for the pre-emption – 50 acres in addition to the homestead requirements – could also be satisfied on the homestead.

- Title to the pre-emption could be obtained when a fixed price for the land had been paid by installments over eight years.

Not all land was available for homesteading. In each township, the sections were allotted as follows:

- Homestead lands – even-numbered sections, except 8 and 26;
- Hudson’s Bay Company lands – section 8, three-quarters of section 26 and all of section 26 in every fifth township;
- Railway lands – odd-numbered sections, except 11 and 29; and
- School lands – sections 11 and 29.

Churches and Cemeteries

A description of homesteading would not be complete without discussing the role played by the churches. The priests worked tirelessly to attend to the spiritual and corporal needs of the homesteaders. Many homesteaders became despondent by the overwhelming challenges of homesteading and the priests were always there to provide comfort and encouragement. The priests had to endure the same hardships as their parishioners so they understood the magnitude of the stresses.

For today's genealogists, the church records, where available, and cemetery headstones are great sources of information about the homestead generation. The location of the following churches, missions and cemeteries can be found on Map 2.

Until churches were built, the travelling priests would hold mass at one of the larger homes in the area. Churches were built soon after the family sod houses; the churches sometimes also made from sod. They were expanded and replaced as more settlers arrived.

The churches were both a spiritual and cultural centre. Families would dress in their finest for summer picnics on the church grounds. It was here that many courtships would begin.

Starting With That Sod House

Settlers arrived in St. Joseph's Colony with varying means. Some arrived with a boxcar containing livestock, farming equipment and furniture. Others, particularly those coming directly from Russia, arrived with only a small amount of cash and a few personal possessions. My grandfather John Vollman fell into that last category. I believe that what I have learned about his homesteading experience is typical of most settlers.

The Vollman, Kelsch and Reinbold families travelled together from Battleford by wagon and oxen. The trip from Battleford to the homestead is described by Kelsch as follows:

Each farmer bought a wagon, two oxen and a cow. One hand plow, one cook stove with two lids, the oven was on the stove pipe. One shot gun, one box of shot gun shells, ten pounds of gun powder and ten pounds of pellets. One box of felt and two thousand caps to make your own gun shells. Also a good supply of groceries, a scythe and hammer. We left Battleford by wagon train, each had a cow tied on behind. We drove for six days. When we arrived there was no house, no well, no neighbours. They unloaded the wagons covering everything up with hay. Took the wagon box off, turned it upside down, that way we lived for three days. Then they dug a trench two feet deep, seven feet wide and twelve feet long. Built sod walls four feet high, put a roof on with poplar poles, willows and hay to cover and more sod on top. Then moved in for four weeks. After that they built a real house out of sod. It was 14 by 14 by 7 high.

I have read two versions concerning the cutting of sod for the house. The first version is that strips were cut from where the house would be located. Plowing then progressed outward from the house until enough sod was cut for the house, usually about an acre of sod. The cleared area around the house served also as a firebreak. The second version is that the sod was cut from slough bottoms. The reason was that the sod in slough bottoms was more permeated with roots which were thick and strong, adding integrity to the sod building strips. Either approach appears plausible in light of the topography around the homestead. Often a skeletal form of poplar was constructed to guide the sod laying.

The sod for the house was cut using the same plow that would be used for breaking the land. The sod strips were rectangular, usually one foot by two feet. They were laid much like brick, grass side down, with alternating courses for strength, to produce a wall two feet thick. Each course was leveled by shaving off the high spots with a sharp spade. That dirt was tamped into the low spots and between all joints. A door and at least two windows were built in while the sod was being laid. The thermal mass of the sod was very effective in protecting the settlers from the cold and heat. I read a humorous account of settlers who installed the door to open outwards. With the first heavy snowfall the exterior was packed with snow and the occupants were trapped inside the dwelling. It was quickly learned that doors on these sod shacks had to open inwards!

For the roof, poplar or aspen poles were laid close together and covered by woven layers of slough hay, sod and a tamped layer of clay. Typically, these sod houses were meant as temporary shelter for a few years until the homesteader had enough money to buy wood for a framed house.

Battleford would remain the only source of supplies in the initial years. A trip to Battleford was no small task. The usual route was to travel north to intersect the Sounding Lake to Battleford Indian Trail. Typical prices for household supplies purchased in Battleford were as follows;

- apples, 1 dollar for 25 pounds,
- butter, 15 cents a pound,
- eggs, 15 cents a dozen,
- flour, 1.75 dollars for a hundred pound sack,
- jam, 50 cents for seven pound pail,
- sugar, 8 cents a pound,
- yeast, 1.25 dollars a box,
- candles, 65 cents for a five pound box,
- suit of clothes, 5 dollars,
- overalls, 1.75 dollars,
- shoes, 1.75 dollars,
- tin heater, 1.25 dollars,
- cast iron cook stove 25 to 40 dollars, and
- letter stamp, 2 cents and postcard stamp 1 cent.

Battleford was also where settlers could buy the farming things they needed;

- oxen, 200 dollars a yoke (2 oxen),
- horses 400 to 500 dollars a pair
- wagon, 90 dollars, and
- walking plow, 24 dollars.

The next job was to make the land suitable for plowing. Tree roots were pulled. Large rocks could break or bend a plow so they had to be removed before sod turning could start. They were removed with spade and crowbar and hauled away by oxen. The rock removal could easily consume as much time as the plowing.

I remember visiting the homestead as a young boy and noticing what I was told was a scythe behind the house. Dad showed me how it was used to harvest the initial crops. He made a large sweeping motion with the scythe to level a large patch of hay in one swoop. Kelsch describes the entire crop cycle as follows:

The first year they each broke about 10 acres, which they put in crop by hand. It was cut by scythe and picked up by hand and made into bundles. Then put into stooks. When dry, the oxen were driven around on it to tramp out the grain.

The single-furrow walking plow, pulled by two oxen, broke the sod and turned it over so that the grass would die. Breaking up the exposed soil was likely done by hand with shovel and rake or with a crude drag made from large logs. The seed was then broadcast by hand and then covered with hand tools or a drag.

This primitive method of harvesting would soon give way to a disk for seeding, horse drawn binders, stooking and then hauling the sheaves to a threshing machine where they were pitched in for separation. Combines and swathers were introduced just before 1940 but it would be a decade before threshing machines disappeared from the scene.

Many settlers mortgaged their homestead so that they could purchase supplies, horses and machinery. These loans were typically for about \$1000 at a time when wheat was selling for half a buck a bushel. This proved risky for many because entire crops could be lost in some years due to hail, frost or insects.

The settlers had to adapt what they knew about farming in Russia to the drier and colder conditions on the prairies. In the early years frost killed many crops. At that time Red Fife, a fine milling and baking wheat, was the dominant variety. Dr. Saunders Marquis decided to cross Red Fife with its large yield and great gluten content with Hard Red Calcutta, a strand from India which matured about 21 days before Red Fife. The result was Marquis wheat that matured 7-10 days earlier than Red Fife, was shorter, generated a huge yield of around 41.6 bushels per acre, and produced high quality baking. Not only did Marquis wheat become famous across Canada, it earned Dr. Saunders a \$1000 prize for the "best wheat variety in Canada," as offered by the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1911.

Education was the responsibility of the province. A standard curriculum was developed and teachers hired provided certain conditions were met such as a minimum number of homesteads and children. In the summer they would study their catechism for two weeks. Some students made it to grade 8, but in many cases they would have to abandon their studies, perhaps as early as grade 4, as they became mature enough to work and help the family. In the summer and sometimes in the winter the children would walk to school. On cold days they drove a one-horse sleigh. The schools had barns in those days for the horses. The school also had an outdoor privy. Subjects typically taught at the one room schools were:

Grade one: phonics, reading, writing, health, arithmetic, oral language and art.

Grades two and three; the above plus spelling and written language.

Grades four and five; the above plus Canadian history and geography.

Grades six to eight; English history and grammar were added.

For some subjects two or more grades could be combined and the remaining grades did seatwork. In the evenings, the teacher had to mark the written work plus prepare lessons and seatwork for eight grades the next day.

Within a few years after the arrival of the first homesteaders, railways were built to link most of the communities. Their location is shown on Map 2. They were important for the movement of

goods throughout the Colony and also provided good jobs and income for men during construction.

Most of the children in the pioneer days were born at home without the assistance of a doctor; some with the assistance of a midwife. When someone became ill, home remedies such as herbs, mustards and other plasters, or wrapping in blankets to cause heavy perspiration, were used. The flu, diphtheria and typhoid took many lives.

By the end of the 1920s farmers were quite well-to-do. Fortunes changed in the summer of 1929; one of the driest ever. Stubble crops could not be cut at all, while summer fallow wheat yielded less than two bushels per acre. The drought and depression began in 1929 and grew progressively worse until it reached its peak in 1937. The October Wall Street crash in 1929 started the depression in western Canada, and caused the complete collapse in prices for grain and cattle. Most of the people were on social welfare. We know that the children had to help out and to get jobs as soon as they were able. Things improved in the 1940s when good crops were harvested in the majority of years. From then on, farming was on a sounder footing.

About the Author

I was born in Macklin in 1944 and grew up on a farm 3 miles west of Luseland. My parents were both descendants of Germans from Russia. The Vollmans came directly to St. Joseph's Colony from Crimea. The Deiberts were Kutschurgans and came via North Dakota.

My parents both came from typically large families; my father from a family of 12 children and my mother was also one of 12 children. My father's family and friends lived on the western side of the Colony and my mother's on the east. Therefore, attending family, church, social and sports events exposed me to nearly every community in the Colony. As I completed ancestry research on my Vollman and Deibert relatives, I realised that I had developed the interest and research means to fairly easily document all of the GFR homesteaders in the Colony. It was surprising how many of the surnames rang familiar to me. I have attempted to structure this report so that descendants of these homesteaders can understand where their ancestors came from in Russia and where they settled in the Colony.
